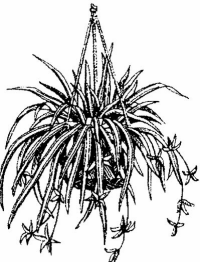

As we close one decade and open another, I want to express my deepest gratitude for your support. Individuals and community alike have been incredible, making a significant difference for our organization, and more importantly, for those we serve. With your help, we have grown and matured in

so many different ways. Looking back ten years, we can measure the following gains in the organization's capacity and staffing:

- Financial growth of 714% (from \$70,000 to over \$500,000).
- Workforce development increase of 79% (The majority of staff are former program participants.).
- Student class hours increased from 820 to 21,904 students per year.
- Enrollment increased by 48%.
- Housing and emergency services increased from 1,750 to 10,255 services in 2010.
- Measurable results and documented outcomes for early learning and English classes.

You make it all possible.

In the upcoming decade, we will focus attention and resources on creating our vision for the future. Yakima Interfaith Coalition's board of directors will also continue to provide leadership for our two core programs: La Casa Hogar and 107 House. 2011 will bring an organization-wide leadership review, as well as a strategic plan for programs and facilities. 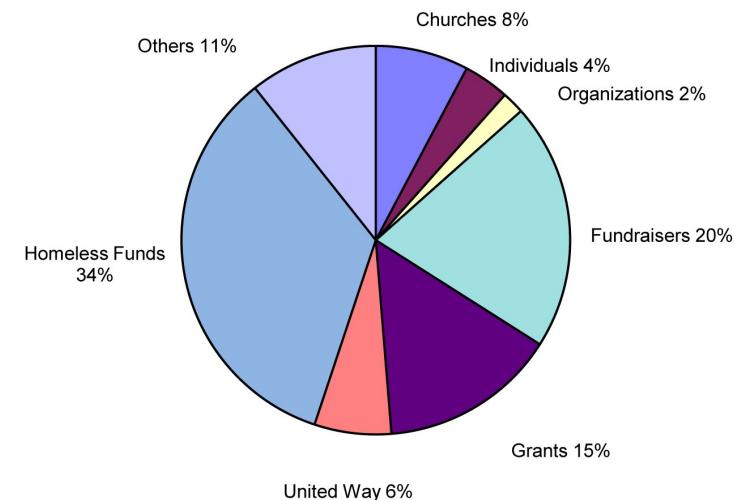
